

# Sun Letters

### **Definition**

Lām Shamsiyyah is the "sun letter Lām" — a silent "L" (الأم) in the definite article "リ" (al-) that is not pronounced when followed by a sun letter (حرف شمسی). Instead, the first letter of the noun is doubled using shaddah ( \*).

#### Rule

When "ال" comes before a sun letter (حرف شمسى):

The "Lām" (づ) is silent

The sun letter is pronounced with shaddah ( \*)

# حروف) What are the Sun Letters? (شمسية

The 14 sun letters are:

ت، ث، د، ذ، ر، ز، س، ش، ص، ض، ط، ظ، ل، ن

You can memorize them using the phrase:


"تَتُرُ دَدُرُ رَسِسُ صَضْطَطٌ لَن"

These letters cause assimilation (Idghām) of the Lām in "じ".

# Moon Letters



#### **Definition**

Lām Qamariyyah is the "moon letter Lām" — a pronounced "L" (لام) in the definite article "ال" (al-) when it comes before a moon letter (حرف قمري).

#### **Rule**

When "ול" (al-) is followed by a **moon letter**:

- The Lām (IJ) is pronounced clearly
- The next letter is not doubled (no shaddah)

#### (حروف قمرية) ?What are the Moon Letters

The 14 moon letters are:

You can memorize them using this mnemonic phrase:

"ابغ حجك وخف عقيمه" (abgh ḥajjaka wakhif ʿaqīmahu) — a classical Arabic memory aid.

#### How to Spot Lām Qamariyyah:


- The letter after "ال" is a moon letter
- The "Lām" (IJ) is pronounced
- The next letter has no shaddah







# مَدّ بالياء Madd with Yā'



### !in Arabic مَدّ بالياء / Madd with Yā' مد بالألف بالياء (Madd with Yā' مد بالألف بالياء )

(Madd bi al-Yā') is one of the **three natural madd letters** (حروف المد) used in **Tajweed and Arabic phonetics**. It refers to **lengthening** the vowel sound **ee** (ع) when preceded by a kasrah (ع).

#### **Definition:**

اَمُذَ بالياء A madd (extension) that occurs when the letter Yā' (و) is preceded by a kasrah (-), and the Yā' is sakin (وُ) and not a part of the root word's consonants.

lt's a type of natural madd (مَدَ طبيعي — extended two harakahs (counts).

#### Structure:

- Kasrah (-) before
- Sākin Yā' (يُ) after



("long "ee") و + يْ = يـ










#### Example Words of Madd with Yā' (مد بالياء):

Arabic Word	With Madd	Transliteration	Meaning
كِتَابِي	ي	kitābī	my book
قِيلَ	ي	qīla	it was said
حَمِيمٍ	ي	<u></u> ḥamīmin	boiling water (in Hell)
سَمِيعٌ	ي	samīʿun	All-Hearing
مَثِيبٌ	ي	manībun	one who repents





































# **Prepositions**

#### **Definition**

A preposition (حَرُفُ الْجَرِّ - called /harf ul ĵarr/ in Arabic) is a single letter or a word which connects two nouns, or a verb and a noun to form a sentence.

حرف الجرّ	Meaning	Example Arabic	Example Translation
مِن	from	مِنَ البيتِ	from the house
إلى	to / towards	إلى المدرسةِ	to the school
عن	about / from	عن الطالب	about the student
على	on / upon	على الطاولةِ	on the table
في	in / inside	في المسجدِ	in the mosque
Ļ	by / with (means)	بالقلم	with the pen
ک	like / as	كَالْأُسدِ	like a lion
٦	for / belonging to	لِلمعلّم	for the teacher

# **Tanween Damma**



### ?(´´) Tanween Damma تنوین ضمة What is

**Tanween Damma** is a short vowel symbol in Arabic () that adds the "-un" sound to the end of an indefinite noun.

- It looks like: (-) ضمتين - It sounds like: "-**un**"
- It means: The word is **indefinite** (not specific like "a book" instead of "the book").
- Examples of تنوین ضمة Tanween Damma in Arabic and English:

Arabic (with tanween)	Pronunciation	English Meaning
كِتابٌ	kitaabun	a book
قَلَمٌ	qalamun	a pen
وَلَدٌ	waladun	a boy
بَيْتُ	baytun	a house
قَمَرٌ	qamarun	a moon

## **Sentences:**

- هذا كِتابٌ مفيدٌ 1.
  - → This is a useful book.
- رأيتُ قَمَرًا في السماء، وكان بجانبه نَجْمٌ 2.
  - $\rightarrow$  I saw a moon in the sky, and there was a star next to it.
- اشتريتُ قَلْمًا جديدًا، وكُرَةً أيضًا 3.
  - $\rightarrow$  I bought a new pen and also a ball.





# Haraf Mushaddad

#### **Definition**

A ḥarf mushaddad (حرف مشدد) is a letter that has a shaddah (´) on it. It is pronounced twice:

- First as a sukoon (no vowel)
- Then as a **voweled** letter

#### **Explanation**

The **shaddah** ( ) indicates that the letter is **doubled** in pronunciation, even though it is **written once**.

So when you see a shaddah, it means:

- There are two of the same letter back-to-back.
- The first one is sukoon (silent), the second carries the vowel.

Examples of حرف مشدد (Harf Mushaddad):

Word	Harf Mushaddad	Pronunciation	Meaning

شدّ	دّ	shadd (shad-da)	to pull
حقّ	قّ	<i>ḥaqq</i> (ḥaq-qa)	truth / right

مرّة	ر	marr-ah	one time / once
معلِّم	び	muʻallim	teacher
