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CONVENTIONS > ADJECTIVES AND ADVERBS

Authors use **adjectives** and **adverbs** to give more information about the nouns and verbs in their sentences. An adjective modifies, or adds meaning to, a noun or a pronoun. An adverb modifies, or adds meaning to, a verb, an adjective, or another adverb.

Adjectives modify a noun or pronoun, as stated above. For example, in the sentence *She held the heavy tray*, the adjective *heavy* modifies the noun *tray*. It answers the question *What kind?* The following chart gives examples of the questions that adjectives answer.

What kind?	hot, short, difficult, clean, complex
Which one?	that, this, those
How many?	five, several, twelve
How much?	most, some, little, immense
Whose?	his, their, my, your

Adverbs provide more information about a verb, adjective, or adverb. For example, in the sentence *They studied diligently*, the adverb *diligently* modifies the verb *studied*, answering the question *In what manner?* The following chart provides examples of questions that adverbs answer. Remember that adverbs often end in the suffix *-ly*.

When?	now, before, yesterday
Where?	everywhere, here, ahead
In what manner? loudly, correctly, confidently	
To what extent?	too, completely, totally

Avoid using adjectives in place of adverbs, as shown in this example:

Incorrect: Think quick. **Correct:** Think quickly.
