I Am Offering This Poem/The Writer/Hugging the Jukebox

Figurative language is language that is used imaginatively rather than literally. Figurative language includes one or more figures of speech—literary devices that make unexpected comparisons or change the usual meaning of words. Some types of figures of speech include the following:

Simile: a comparison of two things using *like, as, than,* or *resembles*

Metaphor: a comparison of one thing as if it were another
