1. Concept Vocabulary

Students should know the meaning and usage of these words from the story:

Word Meaning / How It's Used in the Story

Milled Moving around aimlessly or without order

Skittered Moved quickly and lightly

Quivering Shaking or trembling

Colt A young male horse

Stallion A mature male horse, usually strong and

proud

Tip: Be able to identify these words in sentences and choose the correct meaning.

2. Characters

Know the main characters and their roles:

- **Bob Lemmons** A young cowboy who quietly observes and understands the horses.
- Warrior The wild stallion Bob tries to tame.
- Horses in the Herd React differently, but eventually trust Bob.

Tip: Think about how each character behaves and why their actions are important to the story.

3. Plot

Important events to remember:

1. Bob approaches the wild horses quietly and patiently.

- 2. The herd mills nervously but watches him.
- 3. Bob builds trust with the horses, especially the stallion Warrior.
- 4. Warrior and the wild stallion have a key interaction (fight or confrontation).
- 5. Bob successfully understands and works with the horses.
- 6. Ending: Bob dreams of living free with the mustangs.

Tip: Be able to put events in order and identify the **climax** of the story.

4. Themes and Ideas

Students should understand:

- Bond Between Humans and Animals: Bob's patience and understanding help him succeed.
- Patience and Observation: Acting quietly and observing carefully is more effective than force
- Respect for Nature: Understanding the animals' behavior is key to working with them.

- Bob is patient and almost becomes "one of the horses."
- He does **not** rely on shouting or ropes to control the herd.
- The wild stallion protects the herd.
- Bob's goal is **not** to make money; it's to bond with the horses.

6. Writing Preparation

Students should be able to:

- Write a paragraph explaining how Bob's understanding of horses helps him succeed.
- Use at least two examples/details from the story.
- Include: topic sentence, supporting details, and a conclusion.

Example starters:

- "Bob succeeds because he is patient and watches the horses carefully. For example, ..."
- "Understanding the horses helps Bob because ..."

7. Study Tips

- Re-read the story and highlight vocabulary words.
- Make a timeline of **key events**.
- Practice explaining the main theme in your own words.
- Think of **examples from the story** to support your answers in writing.
